2025 CTA Summer Institute: July 15, 2025

At CTA Summer Institute, Aspiring Educators were not just trained to be effective union leaders—they were reminded of who we are, where we have been, and where we are going as a *union*.

CTA-AE Statewide Board Members Giselle Reyes (REAC Director), Sofia Reynoso Sandoval (State Council Representative), and Gabriel Mendoza, Jr. (President) grounded themselves in the histories that have brought the labor movement forward and asked bold, necessary questions about the future we are building together.

Gabriel attended the Emerging Leaders Strand, where he explored what it means to lead with vision, courage, and strategy in a moment of political urgency.

"This week was a fresh reminder that leadership extends beyond titles, but is centered on the importance of showing up—showing up with purpose, heart, and vision. In the Emerging Leaders Strand, I was pushed to think critically about the history of our union, how we build power, how we sustain movements, and how we make sure that our members are not left behind. As Aspiring Educators, we are not here to play it safe, we are here to challenge systems, demand dignity, and to organize for the schools our communities deserve. Stronger Members. Stronger Union. Sofia and Giselle participated in the Organizing Stand, where they dove deeply into movement-building, campaign planning, and member mobilization.

AE's learned that unions raise that standard for all, and that our work must be reciprocal, not transactional. We do not show up just to teach—we show up to transform, to organize, to demand better.

From the **We Cannot Wait Campaign**—which calls for *fully staffed schools, increased educator pay* and benefits, and no cuts or school closured—to deep conversations about respect, dignity, and power, we faced the hard truth: educators are being asked to give everything while receiving so little. But we are not afraid.

- "Attacks on working people are bipartisan—but we have nothing to fear."
- "We are not an insurance company—we are a union."

We were pushed to ask: Can we leave this organization stronger than we found it? Yes—because we are building strength in members and strength in teams that move together. We don't avoid conflict. We don't implode under pressure. We rise and we organize.

Educators cannot be disrespected any longer because we will find a way to shut it down.

Because patriotism cannot replace pay.
Because the love for our students should not replace dignity.
Because todos estamos en la lucha.

AEs left Summer Institute ready—ready to organize, ready to lead, and ready to demand.

- 5. Share your governing documents, ie: Chapter By-Laws we have samples you can use!

Aspiring Educators Make Waves at NEA Conference in Portland!

From June 28 to July 1, aspiring educators from across the country gathered in Portland, Oregon for the National Education Association's Aspiring Educators Conference. For four electric days, we connected, collaborated, and created lifelong memories. And yes, the vibes were immaculate. California was proud to be there—and we're already looking ahead to next year.

This year's conference centered on a powerful truth: *Our work as educators is inherently political*. From AB540 protections to ICE raids, access to education is on the line—and it's on all of us to take action. As one speaker put it: "You may not care about politics, but politics cares about you."

NEA Executive Director Kim Anderson reminded attendees, "I didn't know what I was doing—I just knew something was wrong and I needed to help them." She challenged us to ask who holds power, whose stories are told, and whose are left out. NEA President Becky Pringle drove it home: "You're not the future of our union. You're the NOW."

2025 NEA Representative Assembly Report

Dear CTA Aspiring Educators,

Que tremendo honor to represent California's aspiring educators at this year's National Education Association (NEA) Representative Assembly (RA), as both a delegate and in my role as CTA-AE President. This year's RA was truly historic. Not only did delegates fulfill all of our essential governance responsibilities, but we also participated in a powerful Day of Teaching, Learning, and Organizing for Power, designed to help us build the skills and strategies needed to confront the challenges of today's political landscape and the attacks made by this Administration onto our profession.

Being surrounded by thousands of passionate educators from across the country reaffirmed just how deeply committed we are as educators to advancing equity, strengthening our union, and securing a future for public education that is safe, inclusive, and just for all students.

Throughout the Assembly, I witnessed courageous leadership, rigorous debate, and bold action. From policy decisions to innovative initiatives, energy and passion filled the room. I am proud to share the following highlights and key outcomes that I believe will shape our work moving forward.

HIGHLIGHT: New Business Item 42 - Establishing a National Scholarship Fund for Aspiring Educators

One of the most exciting proposals introduced this year was New Business Item 42, which was referred to the appropriate NEA committee, to create a national scholarship program that would find at least two Aspiring Educators to attend every official NEA conference annually. The scholarship is intended to cover registration, lodging, transportation, and potential additional funding to support more aspiring educators. This initiative is a meaningful step towards investing in the next generation of education leaders. I remain vigilant and look forward to seeing how this develops.

Leadership and Inspiration:

The keynote speeches were more than just words, they were calls to action that moved through the room and reminded us of our shared hope.

Becky Pringle, our NEA President, spoke with fire and grace, calling on us to, "use our power to take action that leads, action that liberates, action that lasts". Her voice didn't just speak, it ignited. Reminding us that leadership is not about waiting; it is about stepping forward, even when the road is steep.

Building on that momentum, Ashlie Crosson, the National Teacher of the Year, reminded us that, "Now more than ever, we are tasked with building a better future." She spoke to the strength and resilience of our union and affirmed our collective ability to rise to this moment—for our students, our colleagues, and our country.

At the Assembly, delegates also elected Dr. Tia Mills and Bill Farmer to the NEA Executive Committee, whose leadership will guide the union into the future.

Innovations in Assembly Structure:

A major change at this year's Assembly was the adoption of a new debate format, grouping New Business Items into six thematic "buckets." This structure allowed for more focused and productive discussions centered around NEA's core values. These buckets included elevating the profession, advancing equity and justice, growing the union, strengthening democracy, promoting peace, and managing NEA operations.

Advancing Equity and Educational Excellence:

 ADOPTED | NBI 6: NEA will develop a micro-credential based on prior research to equip educators with targeted strategies to support experienced multilingual learners in

- developing academic language proficiency and existing English language development services.
- ADOPTED | NBI 10: NEA will create and distribute a toolkit to assist locals in providing information and steps for Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) and Temporary Protected Status (TPS) members to explore employer-based sponsorship options, strengthening support for immigrant educators.
- ADOPTED | NBI 47: NEA will establish a working group, consisting of at least five educators
 within their first seven years in the profession, to plan a nationwide conference focused on
 professional development tailored to early career educators.
- REFERRED | NBI 8: NEA will develop research surveys targeting Asian American and Pacific Islander educators to identify and track best practices that increase recruitment and retention of AAPI educators.
- ADOPTED | NBI 12: NEA will promote and celebrate National Black Teacher Appreciation
 Day on May 7, 2026, using existing media platforms to honor Black educators and grow the
 Black teacher pipeline.
- ADOPTED | NBI 14: June 2 will be recognized annually on the NEA calendar as "Piper Day" starting in 2026. NEA will publish articles highlighting Alice Piper's 1924 landmark California Supreme Court case that challenged racial segregation decades before Brown v. Board of Education.
- ADOPTED | NBI 22: NEA will actively support the nationwide implementation of K-12 curriculum mandates including Asian American and Pacific Islander history, heritage, and contributions to promote racial justice and counter anti-Asian bias.

Union Strength & Worker Rights:

ADOPTED | NBI 1: NEA commits to strongly supporting unions in aligning contract
expirations to amplify collective bargaining power. The union will work with state and local
affiliates to dismantle no-strike laws where they exist, restore collective bargaining rights,
secure fair contracts, and organize alongside the broader labor movement in advance of
International Workers' Day, May 1, 2026.

Defending Democracy & Civil Rights:

- ADOPTED | NBI 58: NEA declares its support for mass democratic movements opposing authoritarianism, including the "No Kings" movement and efforts resisting federal overreach against states like California. NEA stands with activists defending democracy, free speech, civil rights, labor, and due process.
- ADOPTED | NBI 59: NEA opposes attempts to revoke birthright citizenship by reverting to
 pre-civil rights "states' rights" legal frameworks aimed at denying citizenship to children of
 immigrants. The union will organize alongside other groups to resist these attacks.
- ADOPTED | NBI 63: NEA opposes Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) actions targeting student leaders and will defend students' rights to free speech, dissent, and organizing—especially in opposition to policies affecting marginalized groups including LGBTQ+ students.
- ADOPTED & REFERRED | NBI 39: NEA will no longer use, endorse, or publicize materials or programs from the Anti-Defamation League (ADL), reflecting a reassessment of organizational partnerships.

As we return to our classrooms, campuses, and communities, the work ahead of us is clear and urgent. The 2025 NEA Representative Assembly reminded us that we are not just educators, we are organizers, advocates, and defenders of justice. The decisions made, the voices raised, and collective vision shaped at the Assembly have reaffirmed our power to create meaningful change.

For California's aspiring educators, this is our moment to lead with boldness, to build bridges across difference, and to demand a public education system for every child. From coast to classroom, let us carry this momentum forward, because the fight for equity, democracy, and dignity in education is far from over. We are just getting started.
