# 1. PROPOSED PRELIMINARY REPORT ON STATE COUNCIL REPRESENTATION 2023-2024 STATE COUNCIL REDISTRICTING

Recommended with the following changes:

District A: It was noted that the ESP members were inadvertently left off of the proposed plan, that was a clerical error, the ESP members are now included in the amended plan.

District D: An alternate plan was recommended with the approval of the Board member, Representation Committee member and those who sought a change to the original plan. District D is still losing a seat, it is just a different configuration. (See Attachment A)

District Q: There was an error in HE-8, they are in Service Center One SC, not Southeastern SC.

#### FOR COUNCIL INFORMATION

#### 1. SSM Committee - Review and Update of Safety Policies

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors the School Safety School Management Policy Subcommittee request to meet on the Friday of the January, March, and May 2023 State Council meetings beginning at noon for the purpose of completing a comprehensive review and update of all safety policies.

The Board did not approve the recommendation. The subcommittee can meet Friday evening. [November 2022]

#### 2. CRE Committee – Training Topics

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors the Civil Rights in Education Committee recommendation that CTA continue to prioritize, advertise, and build on CTA sponsored, and member-led training topics (specifically those related to trauma informed teaching and learning) through the season pass/virtual pass, online resources and training at the various conferences, as well as on the website.

The Board approved the recommendation [November 2022]

#### 3. CRE Committee – Bargaining for Decreased Caseloads

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors the Civil Rights in Education Committee recommendation that CTA work with staff and develop resources to support bargaining for decreased caseloads for counselors, social workers, and school psychologists, and to increase the number of counselors and student support services personnel.

The Board approved the recommendation and referred it to the Executive Director for feasibility and investigation. [November 2022]

#### 4. CRE Committee – Fully Staffed Support Professional Teams

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors the Civil Rights in Education Committee recommendation that CTA encourage local chapters to advocate, in conjunction with parent, student, and community groups, for fully staffed support professional teams that include credentialed counselors, psychologists, social workers, nurses, other student support service members, and paraprofessionals.

The Board approved the recommendation. [November 2022]

#### 5. CRE Committee - Member Input on School Climate and Safety

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors the Civil Rights in Education Committee recommendation that CTA seek member input on school climate and safety annually and report the findings to CTA membership.

The Board approved the recommendation and referred it to the Executive Director for implementation. [November 2022]

#### 6. CRE Committee – Data on Educators Leaving Districts/Profession

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors the Civil Rights in Education Committee recommendation that CTA gather and examine data on why educators have left their districts, which may include holding focus groups to assess why educators are leaving the profession, and/or retiring prematurely.

The Board approved the recommendation. [November 2022]

#### 7. CRE Committee – Social Emotional Learning

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors the Civil Rights in Education Committee recommendation that CTA support Social Emotional Learning practices, professional development, and explicit curriculum that builds student and educators' Social Emotional Learning skills, including using the transformative Social Emotional Learning framework.

The Board approved the recommendation. [November 2022]

#### 8. CPD Committee – Increase in Breach of Contract Sanctions

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors the Credentials and Professional Development Committee recommendation to address the increase in breach of contract sanctions by working with appropriate departments to determine the best approach to address the upward trend in sanctions against teachers for breach of contract.

The Board approved the recommendation. [January 2023]

#### 9. STL Committee – New Chairs/Consultants Training

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors the State Legislation Committee request to conduct training of new legislative subcommittee chairs and consultants at the January 2023 State Council meeting.

The Board approved the recommendation. [November 2022]

#### 10. NBI 5/22-6- Daily Meal Allowance

State Council referred to the Budget Committee NBI 5/22-6: CTA should increase the daily meal allowance from \$85 per day to \$100 per day.

The Board did not approve NBI 5/22-5; approved increasing the daily meal allowance to \$90 per day. [November 2022]

#### 11. NBI 5/22-22- Portage Allowance

State Council referred to the Budget Committee NBI 5/22-22: CTA will increase the reimbursement allowance for portage from \$7 per day to \$10 per day.

The Board did not approve NBI 5/22-22; approved increasing the daily portage allowance to \$8 per day. [November 2022]

#### 12. NBI 10/22-3 – Conference Tracks Geared to Specialists

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors NBI 10/22-3: That CTA include tracks and/or sessions at the Good Teaching Conference and New Educator Conference geared to specialists including but not limited to: counselors, nurses, psychologists, speech and language pathologists, program specialists, and social workers.

The Board referred NBI 5/22-3 to the Good Teaching, Special Ed and New Educator Conference Planning Committees. [November 2022]

#### 13. NBI 10/22-4 – Leadership/Union Engagement Sessions

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors NBI 10/22-4: That CTA provide leadership and union engagement sessions at regional leadership conferences and the Issues Conference specifically geared to specialists including but not limited to: counselors, nurses, psychologists, speech and language pathologists, program specialists, and social workers to help them become association leaders.

The Board referred NBI 5/22-4 to the Issues and Regional Conference Planning Committees. [November 2022]

#### 14. NBI 10/22-6- Promote Public Transportation to CTA Events

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors NBI 10/22-6: That CTA promote the use of public transportation to get to CTA events by providing supportive information in event registration materials.

The Board approved NBI 10/22-6 and referred it to the to the Executive Director for implementation. [November 2022]

#### 15. NBI 10/22-7 - Restrooms at NEA RA

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors NBI 10/22-7: That CTA advocate on behalf of members towards ensuring that the ratio of women to men's restrooms at the NEA RA will be at least 2:1 and that there will be more gender-neutral bathrooms available as well.

The Board referred NBI 10/22-7 to the California NEA Board of Directors. [November 2022]

#### 16. NBI 10/22-12- Childcare Services at CTA Conferences

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors NBI 10/22-12: That CTA expand CTA-provided childcare services to include, but not limited to, leadership conferences, Good Teaching Conferences, New Educator Conferences, and Special Education Conferences.

The Board referred NBI 10/22-12 to the Executive Director for feasibility. [November 2022]

#### 17. NBI 10/22-15- Member Healthcare Survey

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors NBI 10/22-15: The CTA shall conduct a healthcare survey which shall be sent to all members no later than January 2023. The data collected shall be disseminated back to members no later than February 2023. Alterations to the survey may be made with approval of the BATS Caucus.

The Board did not approve NBI 10/22-15. The NBI is too restrictive; the Healthcare Crisis Committee is working on this issue. [November 2022]

#### 18. NBI 10/22-20- Pilot Charter School Salting Program

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors NBI 10/22-20: That CTA create a pilot charter school salting program to explore the potential efficacy and cost-savings of this method. Organizers will be hired by CTA and then also gain employment at a non-unionized charter school. Total compensation for organizers will be on par with equivalent charter school organizers.

The Board did not approve NBI 10/22-20. This issue is already addressed in the Organizing Plan. [November 2022]

#### 19. NBI 10/22-21- Support for H.R. 2307

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors NBI 10/22-21: That CTA support H.R. 2307, the Energy and Innovation and Carbon Act and lobby California's congressional members to support it.

The Board referred NBI 10/22-21 to the California NEA Board of Directors. [November 2022]

#### 20. NBI 10/22-23- Competency Dismissal Panel Policy

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors NBI 10/22-23: That CTA change the CTA policy for the Competency Dismissal Panel by eliminating the 9-year service limit, post-retirement, of speech-language pathologists, especially if the SLPs have returned to work part-time, post-retirement.

The Board did not approve 10/22-23. The Education Code, not CTA policy, requires that a person who serves as a Commission on Professional Competence (CPC) panelist must "hold a currently valid credential and have at least three years' experience within the past 10 years in the discipline of the employee" facing discipline. Members (including retirees) who do not have relevant work experience within the last 10 years are legally ineligible to serve on CPC panels. [November 2022]

#### 21. NBI 10/22-26 - Exclusion from CTA Elected Office

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors NBI 10/22-26: That Members who have been requested to return funds to a CTA affiliate and have refused to do so after a formal investigation and written request by the association, shall not be allowed to hold any elected office in CTA. This includes but is not limited to local/service center/state CTA.

The Board did not approve NBI 10/22-26 as the requested action conflicts with CTA Bylaws and Standing Rules. [January 2023]

#### 22. NBI 10/22-27-CTA Members Registered as Democrats

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors NBI 10/22-27: That CTA communicate with members registered as Democrats in order to: 1) Educate members about upcoming ADEM elections in January. 2) Encourage members to register to vote in these elections. 3) Identify and encourage members to run as ADEM delegates. 4) Notify members of CTA members/staff running for ADEM.

The Board referred NBI 10/22-27 to the Executive Director for investigation. [November 2022]

#### 23. NBI 10/22-28-Ed Code HIPPA Compliance

State Council referred to the CTA Board of Directors NBI 10/22-28: That CTA work to change the Ed Code that is not in compliance with HIPPA that requires new hires to allow full access to their medical records in order to obtain employment.

The Board referred NBI 10/22-28 to the Executive Director for investigation. [November 2022]



LEA's are spending their own money right now for these doses, but now with ED Code and state mandate, this money goes back to the districts with funding at the state level, SB 10 (there needs to be some training program). Let's not leave March council without moving this into support positions, or bundling bills and language so it can codify the training.
    - g. Toni mentioned that in some counties, districts are getting free doses from the Department of Health. There could be a double digit amount of bills just on this topic alone.
    - h. Children and Youth Behavioral Health Initiative- Proposed wellness coaches, and a new fee schedule (January 2024) for LEAs to bill Behavioral Health via Medical reimbursements. There are still concerns and reviews by the legislature budget hearings this year, want legislature to extend timeline so there are more thoughtful programs that can impact students at school sites (10 Billion dollars, half of that impacts LEAs). Some of that money will go to a platform.

- i. Wellness Coaches "Behavioral Coaches 1 and 2" (Wellness Coach Newsletter)districts may find hiring these coaches is cheaper than hiring credentialed school behavioral specialists. We do not want people who are not school employees providing behavioral health services with just a certification from an agency.

He initially served in the CA State Senate from 2016 -2018 and was returned to the State Senate in 2020.

## 2023-24 CA State Budget:

The Governor's Budget does not propose changes to existing programs or additional educator workforce investments but states the Administration is committed to the thoughtful implementation of existing educator programs in the coming year.

Proposes \$3.5 million ongoing funds for all middle and high school sites to maintain at least two doses of fentanyl/opioid overdose medication. Proposes an additional \$10 million for opioid education, testing, recovery, and support (general-not specific to K-12 schools)

- NBI 10/22-13: CTA will lobby to get legislation passed guaranteeing all teachers get a prep
  period during the day and that teachers cannot be forced or asked to substitute or do duties
  during that prep period but instead must volunteer themselves and be paid at least an hourly
  rate for doing it.
  - a. Committee Recommendation: Disapprove
  - b. Rationale: Managing a school looks different across the state, and prohibiting volunteerism may not be workable in some areas and/or circumstances.
- 2. NBI 10/22-31: That CTA lobby the California State Legislation to pass legislation to require school districts to accept all years of service in public education when hiring a new teacher.
  - a. Committee Recommendation: Disapprove
  - b. Rationale: This policy could cause districts to simply not hire veteran teachers due to the labor cost, and bargained agreements are responsive to local staffing needs.
- 3. NBI 10/22-16: That CTA lobby the California State Legislature to pass legislation to change Ed Code to grant an 11th yearly sick leave day to certificated educators who work 11 months.

  - b. Rationale: The proposal would establish parity between certificated and classified school employees.
- 4. NBI 10/22-34: This body is hereby tasked to examine, study, and draft policy language that reinstates teachers' loss of wages resulting from docked pay imposed by their respective school district payroll department via the use of SB114 between the years of 2020-2022.

- a. Committee Recommendation: Disapprove
- b. Rationale: The "up to" \$551 daily obligation that employers paid workers for COVID leave is a rate that was set in federal law.
- 5. NBI 5/22-10 CTA will work to pass legislation to ensure that the starting pay in all school districts for all of our members is above the minimum exempt professional salary level for the county they work in with automatic increases each year to ensure that it never drops below that level.
  - a. Committee Recommendation: Disapprove

The committee recommends to approve NBI #: 1/23-14 CTA shall incorporate language into official policy that states that the CTA fully supports funding the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act at a minimum of 40% - and any legislative or organizational efforts to facilitate that action.

**Rationale:** In 1975, Congress passed the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, and promised that, if needed, it could pay up to 40%. Unfortunately, despite an overwhelming need for increased education funding, Congress has never paid more than 17%. In California alone, this amounts to a \$2 billion annual shortfall - which local districts must cover. The time has come to demand that our elected leaders provide for our most vulnerable students. Incorporating support for fully funding IDEA into CTA policy is a critical step for all future actions.

The committee recommends to approve NBI #: 10/22-19 CTA will create a workgroup that will determine the best solutions, such as legislation, for caseload/workload limits, speech-language pathology assistants, and CTA staff training, for alleviating the workload problems that SLPs are facing and addressing the shortage of SLPs. The workgroup will report to CTA State Council.

**Rationale:** Working conditions are abysmal for speech-language pathologists. They cannot complete the duties in a 16 hour day. They have to choose between not completing duties that will be the least risk for getting them in trouble.

The SEC committee will create a subcommittee to do the work of the workgroup during the regularly schedule state council meeting time. SEC will also reach out to the Student Support Services committee at the next state council to do this work jointly.

A. Academic Freedom

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3. Classroom teachers and other educators must have the responsibility for developing curriculum and selecting instructional materials and methods to meet the goals of that curriculum. They shall be involved in all aspects of adoption and implementation of curricula and materials. The adoption and implementation processes must recognize that individual teachers have different teaching styles and bring unique attributes to their classrooms. Curricula that limit the ability of educators to incorporate teachers' own styles, attributes, and materials infringe upon academic freedom. The professional judgment of classroom teachers and other educators to determine appropriate and aligned curricula is key to student achievement and growth. Local associations and governing boards must adopt/negotiate procedures to be followed when there are criticisms/objections to methods or materials. The content of instruction and resources, including the curation and collection development of materials for both classroom and school libraries, must be judged and controlled by skilled professionals without undue influence or interference by any individual or group. Any individual or group which seeks to inhibit academic freedom must not have influence over the hiring, firing, promotion or due process rights of bargaining unit members.

In light of recent educational attacks, TEAF believes that restricting information and discouraging freedom of thought through the removal of books represents a dangerous practice and a threat to Academic Freedom. The intent of this policy change is to protect our libraries and classrooms from the threat of censorship that has been so prevalent across our great state and nation.

## **INFORMATIONAL ITEMS**

- 1. Paula Merrigan, ECE Committee Chairperson, welcomed the CTA Board Liaison and Committee members. She explained how the meeting would work and gave the following reports:
  - a. The Chair continues to attend the CDE's LIPP Consultation meetings to help create/adjust the implementation procedures for UPK rollout. As the only TK educator in the group, she continuously voices concerns for educators. Most recently the group reviewed data submitted by over 1,400 LEAs on the initial rollout of TK. There were a lot of questions about training/PD. The chair raised a concern about assuring the training/PD being offered is what the educators want, not what LEAs think we need. She expressed that too often educators are required to attend LEA provided PD that does

not address student and educator needs. Educators are too often not engaged when making this decision.

- b. UPK updates:
  - i. The CDE's UPK FAQ page has updated information about UTK.
  - ii. CDE's UPK powerpoint on class size and staffing penalties.
  - iii. It is still unknown if the 10:1 staffing ratio funding will be included in the budget revise. Currently, it is not. Nothing precludes a chapter from bargaining for 10:1 staffing with a class maximum size of 20 before the budget comes out. The TK "Add-on" will be \$2,813 (plus COLA starting FY 2023-24).
- c. The Chair was unable to attend the 1/27/23 Berkeley Children's Forum as it conflicted with State Council meetings.
- d. CTA's New Educator Pipeline & Support Workgroup: we continue to meet and review potential ideas to work with legislators on developing the teacher pipeline. Members with information unique to your LEA that helps address the teacher shortage, especially attracting BIPOC educators, please share it with the Chair so that she can take the information back to the group for our next meeting.
- e. The Chair attended the 12/14/22 ECPC meeting in Sacramento.
- f. Starfish Institute meeting: a group of educators and education advocates talking about the ECE (specifically the UPK) teacher shortage. How do we attract an ethnically diverse teaching population? Is there enough interest to create an education "network" to dive deeper into a teacher shortage solution? They are looking for "likely and unlikely partners" to work together to brainstorm ways to fill the estimated 12,000-16,000 lead teachers and 16,000-20,000 assistant positions needed due to the TK expansion alone. The chair recommended CTA be included in this networking proposal should it come to fruition.
- g. WestEd PLF input meetings: The Chair attended two of the recent PLF update meetings. Susan Abt, our ECE Recorder, also attended the last meeting. The third & final meeting is next week. WestEd was seeking input from various stakeholders on the upcoming revisions to the PLF. The PLF is being modified to be more inclusive of diverse populations for examples of each strand; the age will change to incorporate the new UPK age ranges (3 5½). They are adding listening and speaking strands, creating literacy skills strands and writing skills strands. The PLF is a "guide" (not standards) for planning learning experiences in UPK.
- h. A letter was sent from ECE to FPE requesting ECE be added to the CTA Budget Principles for effective lobbying on behalf of ECE. The letter can be found in the document hub. FPE & ECE are working together to come up with language to express the importance of funding TK at the 10:1 ratio as originally recommended under UPK.
- 2. Toni Trigueiro, Legislative Advocate: Brought to the attention of the committee the following:

  - b. 2023-24 CA State Budget
    - i. Continues expanded eligibility for TK with \$690 million to implement the second year of TK expansion, expanding eligibility to children turning five years old between September 2 and April 2 (approximately 46,000 children).
    - ii. Full implementation of universal TK is expected in 2025-26.
    - iii. Provides \$165 million to support the addition of one certificated or classified staff person in TK classrooms.

- iv. Builds on 2022-23 Budget Act with \$64.5 million Prop 98 GF and \$51.8 million non-98 GF to continue a multiyear plan to ramp up the inclusivity adjustments for the California State Preschool Program (CSPP), the second year of a three-year ramp up, with the final requirement that students with disabilities make up at least 7.5 percent of CSPP providers' enrollment.
- v. Delays the 2023-24 planned \$550 million Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program investment to 2024-25.
- vi. Builds on the 2022-23 Budget Act by providing an additional \$250 million one-time Prop 98 GF for the existing Literacy Coaches and Reading Specialists Grant Program.
- vii. Uses a \$1 million one-time GF to create a Literacy Roadmap to help educators navigate resources effectively and efficiently.
- c. CSU and private colleges are working with the CCTC to implement the new PK to 3 credential.
- d. There is a proposal to codify CA to participate in the Interstate Teachers Mobility Compact (ITMC). This would allow fully qualified teachers to move between state lines. Once introduced, it cannot be amended. Our legislative advocate would like the committee to consider the implications for ECE.

A. Protection for School Personnel -- p. 296

CTA believes all school employees should be safe <u>during lockdowns and</u> from physical attack on their persons or property. <u>CTA believes that if an employee is subject to a lockdown, they should be reimbursed for losses incurred and held harmless in the event of lost time at other <u>employment. CTA also believes that any additional time spent in lockdown should be compensated.</u></u>

Furthermore, CTA believes when school personnel are victims of physical attack, verbal abuse, theft, vandalism, or harassment due to gender, sexual orientation, or other causes, victims should receive the full support of their employer in pursuing legal and other remedies. Should an employee become the victim of such an attack, they should be reimbursed for any loss incurred. If the attack should result in time lost at work, accumulated sick time shall not be affected. Victims should receive the full, immediate support of on-site administrators and school personnel. Local chapters should provide information to school district personnel and juvenile courts in matters concerning issues of assault, battery, loitering, and violation of court restraining orders. (SMC: June 1994, May 1996, May 1997)

SSM believes that when educators miss any additional employment due to a lockdown they should be held harmless for the absence and any losses incurred by being unable to leave their worksite, and should also receive compensation for all extra time spent at their worksite.

### **OTHER ITEMS FOR IMMEDIATE ACTION**

A. NBI#: 3/22-9, Oppose

"Adopt policy language that outlines CTA's expectations of LAW ENFORCEMENT ON CAMPUS."

Rationale: SSM and CRE created a joint subcommittee to investigate the current policy and to discuss creating transformative policy regarding school safety. Current policy exists on the School-to-Prison-Pipeline and Incarceration Prevention (p.397). Both SSM and CRE commit to working together on this issue and plan to bring forward policy recommendations at a future meeting.

B. NBI#: 10/22-17, Support

"That CTA work with legislators to eliminate the requirement for paper copies of attendance verification forms."

Rationale: Educators confirm attendance daily. The requirement to have signed copies of attendance reports is unnecessary; it creates additional work and wastes resources. In this post pandemic digital era, we should be taking steps to modernize the attendance verification process.

C. NBI#: 10/22-29, Support

"That CTA investigate the impact of California SB 328 which requires later start times for secondary schools. This change effects communities, extra-curricular activities, sports, and teaching in a myriad of ways. The results of the investigation will be published in the California Educator and social media."

Rationale: It is unclear if this new law is helping or hurting our profession and our student's learning. As this is a new law, many districts and families have had to scramble and modify transportation, work, and childcare while also additionally challenge students who are heavily involved in sports and after school activities and work. Such an investigations and publication of results may change CTA's advocacy in this area with this current law or future modifications. This bill's intention was to address sleep patterns of teenagers; however, it may be having the averse effect.

Monique charged our members with focusing our work through the lens of safety for all across our state.
- 2) Board Liaison Robert Ellis called attention to the murder of Tyre Nichols and the on-going trauma occurring in our communities and for BIPOC people, the mass shootings in Monterey Park and Half Moon Bay, and the countless injuries suffered by our students and educators across our country. Robert reminded us to maintain personal and property safety practices while at State Council meetings and encouraged our committee to take action in support of racial justice and safety. Robert welcomed EMEID participants to this State Council.
- 3) Staff Consultants Lindsey Tatnall and Christopher Brunette reported on current incidents of violence against educators and students across the nation and the crisis facing educators with violence in our schools. In recent months educators and students in Iowa, Virginia, Florida, Montana, and California have had high-profile incidents resulting in injury and loss of life. Leaders and staff all over California report incidents with educators and students being injured on a regular basis and oftentimes are not equipped with training, resources, and mental health professionals to assist. We encouraged our members to dream big as to ways in which CTA can help provide meaningful change so that all students and educators remain safe in our schools.

It is manifested mainly in the privatization of everything, from production - mines or oil, for instance; to the provision of public services - education, health, or communications. The promoters sell neoliberalism as a system that respects individual rights. In actuality, wherever this ideology has been applied it has created inequality and a dismantling of public services and undermining of democracy. In public education one can detect the influence of neoliberalism by looking at the premises and goals - competition and profit and standardization to measure and determine winners and losers. It stopped being a public service and started to become a private enterprise."

- 3)CPD Board Liaison, Christopher Bushee <u>shared a report</u> covering CTA elections, statewide effort connected to community schools, possible upcoming attacks on public education through the initiative process, the Governor's proposed 2023-2024 budget, and upcoming CTA events and opportunities, including the CTA Political Academies.
- 4)CPD Consultant, Adam Ebrahim provided an update on the CTA New Educator Pipeline Workgroup and the CTA/Stanford/UCLA BIPOC National Board Cohorts.
- 5)CPD Consultant, Halimah Mekki <u>shared information</u> about the Ethnic Minority Early Identification & Development program, shared a flier, and encouraged CPD participants to recruit BIPOC educators to apply.
- 6)CPD Subcommittee Chairs shared findings from the morning CPD policy analysis activity.
- 7)CPD Consultant Adam Ebrahim <u>shared an update</u> on the Teacher Performance Assessment (TPA), including an overview of states where the TPA has been successfully removed. He also provided an update on the development process for the revised Reading Instruction Competence Assessment required by Senate Bill 488 and discussed the implications of this new "Literacy Performance Assessment" for future teacher candidates.
- 8)CPD Chairperson, Angela DerRamos and Vice Chairperson, Kelley Blanc facilitated a consensus-based protocol and discussion to clarify CPD's general stance on the TPA. They further facilitated a whole-group discussion to generate possible guidelines to aid the Teacher Quality and Policy Subcommittees in the development of CPD policy addressing the TPA.
- 9)Subcommittees conducted an afternoon working session. The legislation subcommittee provided feedback on two pieces of legislation related to a proposed Occupational Therapists and Physical Therapists Credential and the proposed Interstate Teacher Mobility Compact. The Policy and Teacher Quality subcommittees began the process of drafting the policy to address the TPA and the Professional Development subcommittee developed recommendations for local supports for teachers affected by COVID who still need to complete the TPA.

A. Critical Thinking

C&I Proposes adding the following new policy to page 275 after "Correspondence Programs".

## Critical Thinking

CTA believes that critical thinking is an essential part of a well-rounded education. CTA also believes that educators play a vital role in teaching critical thinking skills through developmentally appropriate practices. CTA further believes that critical thinking is a developmentally appropriate practice that enables students to analyze, synthesize, evaluate, determine the importance and relevance of arguments and ideas as a guide to belief and action.

Rationale: C&I policy mentions critical thinking in several places but it is never described. This policy would provide a description of what CTA believes critical thinking is.

#### B. Environmental Curriculum

#### Environmental Curriculum

CTA believes environmental education, including climate change, should be integrated across the curriculum. CTA believes in the implementation of an informed, environmental-based curriculum, integrated across all subjects, specifically but not limited to the subject-matter areas of history/social science and science. CTA further believes that all PK-12 students in California should develop a deep understanding of the interconnectedness between natural and human social systems. The curriculum shall include research-based instruction on climate change and environmental justice along with strategies to prepare students to think critically about solutions as they become global citizens. CTA supports comprehensive environmental literacy that increases student understanding, skills, and motivation to make responsible decisions that considers their relationships to natural systems, communities, and future generations.

Rationale: This new language updates the 2008 policy to reflect current research and include cross curricular instruction, environmental justice and environmental literacy.

C. Extended-Day Programs

CTA proposes adding the following policy be added to page 279 after "Essential Skills".

## **Extended-Day Programs**

CTA believes extended-day programs should be developmentally appropriate, adequately staffed, and well-designed. These programs should be connected to the school day and provided by well-compensated, highly-qualified teachers and staff. The curriculum used should be intentional and support Social Emotional Learning, constructive play, and supplement classroom instruction. Additional resources should be available to further develop the whole child. Instruction should occur in a safe and supportive environment that includes active and engaging learning, skill building, and opportunities to develop student leadership. It should focus on healthy choices and behaviors while addressing cultural and language diversity for all students including, but not limited to, those students with disabilities

Rationale: Extended-day programs are currently being implemented in Pk-6th grades throughout California. CTA does not have language in C & I policy that addresses the types of curriculum and instruction that should occur in these new extended day programs.

NBI 10/22-33

Action: CTA will advocate for a reduction in the number of days a STRS member must wait between retirement and substitute teaching.

Rationale: There is a serious shortage of substitute teachers. Currently, retirees must wait 180 days before they are eligible to substitute teach. Although school districts can apply for a waiver to this rule, that waiver often has many restrictions. The shortage of substitute teachers has negatively impacted many programs at sites and districts, as TOSAs, intervention, and resource teachers are being asked to substitute teach. Additionally, many teachers at the secondary level are losing their prep periods to cover classes for their colleagues.

NBI#: 1/23-27

Action: I move that OEA amends the Retirement Savings Plans policy on page 240 (paragraph 4) by inserting: 1. "current and future" 2. "CTA believes that when fiscal feasible, plans should be invested in a manner that supports educational equity for California students." See the attachment for the amended policy.

Rationale: CTA has an obligation to ensure our investments in our member's retirement are financially sound for future and current members. In addition, we have an obligation to ensure our investments align to our values.

## **INFORMATIONAL ITEMS**

- Kevin Welch, Retirement Committee Chair, shared with the committee that the he attended the Schools Services meeting where the slowing economy was discussed. Kevin mentioned that CalSTRS has some of the same concerns with a potentially slowing economy. In particular, CalSTRS has some concerns about how budget cuts could impact statewide payroll as districts look to tighten their belts.
- 2. Joe Bartell, CTA Board Liaison, reminded the committee that CTA will pay up to 6 units for members that earn credits at CTA conferences. He reminded committee members of the need to notify CTA if they are not coming to council on the computer so that the alternate process is triggered. Lastly, Joe shared that Summer Institute will be at UCLA this year and the Bonaventure in the summer of 2024. Due to the Olympics being in LA, future Summer Institutes locations are yet to be determined.
- 3. Seth Bramble, CTA Legislative Advocate, informed the committee that the legislature starts a new two-year legislative session with a turnover in the Chair of the Assembly Public Employment and Retirement committee. He reported that there will be legislation this year to clean up some technical issues in CTA-sponsored AB 1667 (2022) and legislation that allows backdating of retirement, among other issues.
- 4. Ed Foglia, NEA Board Liaison, shared that the HR 82 didn't get a vote in the House last year because the House Ways and Means Committee failed to attach funding to it, so it died in committee. The 306 co-sponsors in the House and the 44 in the Senate likely voted for political reasons to support it but didn't find a way to fund the bill. Ed also said that NEA is concerned with the House of Representatives plan to cut Social Security and Medicare by using the debt ceiling as leverage.
- 5. Mitch Olson and Rose Luna, Retirement Committee Consultants, shared a presentation with the committee focusing on the Public Employee Pension Reform Act (PEPRA) of 2012, creditable compensation regulations for 2% at 60 members, and the CalSTRS unfunded liability.
- 6. MaryKay Scheid, Committee Vice Chair and CalSTRS Liaison, shared CalSTRS, in the 2022 calendar year, saw a return of -6.7%, in spite of the fact that equities and fixed income had double digit losses; still the fund is at \$310 billion and scheduled to be fully funded by 2046. There continues to be many pushing for total divestment from fossil fuels, rather than the CalSTRS pledge to NetZero. CalSTRS shared a success story of engagement (rather than divestment) as far as firearms is concerned. Until last year, there was no code for credit card companies to identify purchases of firearms and ammunition, now there is a code (known as an MCC code). CalSTRS is using its influence, knowing financial companies want to be sure they are not connected to a mass casualty event. CalSTRS is now in the ALM process (which occurs every

- four years), to make decisions about how to set Capital Market Assumptions. They aspire to choose carefully, in order to maintain a 7% annual return on investments to the fund so that employer, employee, and state contributions to the fund are stable.
- 7. John Anderson, CalPERS Liaison, shared CalPERS Investment Returns are in the negative during the last 2 Quarters (-5 & -6%) and their funded status is around 70%. Their top priorities for sustainable investments continue to be advocacy, engagement, partnership, and integration. CalPERS investments will have an increased focus on private markets to maximize investment returns navigating pressure for divestment. Their investments are developing a "growth and innovation" strategy to look for opportunities outside traditional private equity. CalPERS membership education events are forthcoming in February (2/8 & 2/9 virtual), and March (inperson in Anaheim)
- 8. Orval Garrison, CTA/NEA Retired, thanked the Retirement Committee consultants for their work offering trainings to members close to retirement. Orval mentioned that CTA/NEA Retired has dealt with issues where districts are requesting retired teachers to provide service without the required 180 day wait period. By not waiting the 180 days results in penalties to the retirees.

## **INFORMATIONAL ITEMS**

- ACT was asked to provide feedback on the recent Legislative Analyst Office's report on potential reforms/refinements to the California Adult Education Program. The LAO report can be found at <a href="https://LAO.ca.gov/Publications/Report/4652">https://LAO.ca.gov/Publications/Report/4652</a>titled "Redesigning California's Adult Education Funding Model".
  - a. The recommendations by the LAO are the following, with committee feedback:
    - i. Establish Uniform Base Per-Student Adult Education Funding Rate
      - 1. Yes, the committee is in favor of this change, but would prefer based on enrollment, not attendance.
      - 2. Might need a dollar amount base in addition to a per student amount, to create equity for rural districts, much like how the COEs are funded.

- ii. Add Performance Component to Funding for Adult Schools and CCC Noncredit Programs:
  - 1. Would like a component to include immigrant integration.
  - 2. Agree with adding CTE certifications as a component, not just pushing people to 4 year colleges.
  - 3. Need to be clear on what "success" means. Because it could be a job, certifications, etc.
  - Feedback from CCA members in committee cautions around this idea of funding based on "success". Ends up chasing success rather truly providing support needed. Performance based funding has not been successful at CCs.
  - 5. Need alternative forms of "success".
  - 6. Using WIOA (Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act) standards could be a problem, especially if there is a requirement to collect Social Security numbers.
  - 7. Many Adult Ed students do not want to go to Community college, so that should not be only measure.
- iii. Eliminate Fees for Adult School Courses:
  - 1. Yes, the committee is in favor, but there need to be some exceptions
  - 2. Fee elimination needs to be covered by the funding allocation
  - 3. CTE courses may need to charge for materials
  - 4. Need uniformity in what districts charge, if there are any fees (currently wild differences between schools for similar courses)
- iv. Allocate some CAEP Funding Directly for Consortium-Level Activities
  - 1. Is necessary, but at what rate. The report mentions 10%, which seems high. 5% may be a more reasonable amount (is the current amount)
  - 2. Also limit the amount that can be used for administration salaries.
- v. Adjust Funding Allocation Annually to Account for Key Cost Drivers
  - 1. Good plan to allow for growth. Many schools have long waiting lists.
  - 2. Also good that it takes into consideration the adult population and unemployment rates
  - 3. Needs to take into consideration return to pre-2008 funding levels.
  - 4. Needs to reduce fluctuations, perhaps use a rolling average, like LCFF
- vi. Phase in New Funding Model Over Several Years
  - 1. No more than 5 years.
- The next scheduled meeting to review the Draft California State Plan for Career and Technical Assistance is scheduled for 2/3/23. The California Workforce Pathways Joint Advisory Committee's (CWPJAC) anticipates a final version will be shared during their February meeting. The actual document will be posted before the meeting at <a href="https://www.cde.ca.gov/ci/ct/gi/documents/draftcteplan.pdf">https://www.cde.ca.gov/ci/ct/gi/documents/draftcteplan.pdf</a>. There will another 45-to-60-day public comment period.
- 3. Sub-Committee Reports
  - a. Legislative: ACT had no bills to review.
  - b. Career Technical Education: Reviewed policy language. Will also be meeting with a small group from CNI to discuss the feasibility of a CTE high school graduation requirement.
  - c. Adult/Alternative Education: Reviewed the LAO report referenced above to give feedback to CTA.

A. Adoption of the 2023-2024 State Budget Principles

## PreK-12 & Adult Education 2023-24 Budget Principles

CTA believes the state and federal government should provide sufficient funding for public education to ensure all schools can provide a high-quality education and serve the needs of all students. CTA further believes funding for public education is an absolute obligation.

## **PreK through 12 funding:**

- CTA believes the state must provide funding that moves California to the top ten states in perpupil funding.
- CTA believes Proposition 98 should be a floor and not a ceiling for education funding.
- CTA believes we must protect the integrity of Proposition 98. CTA opposes any encroachment from non-Proposition 98 programs into the Proposition 98 side of the budget. CTA opposes any action which would reduce the Proposition 98 funding level.
- CTA believes that Proposition 98 should be protected from reductions through the creation of new or existing tax credits and giveaways that do not provide clear economic benefits to California, including public education. CTA further believes that existing tax credits should be carefully reexamined and repealed where there has not been a benefit to the California economy and public education.
- CTA believes we must support and monitor the Proposition 98 guarantee certification process to ensure it has been properly implemented to provide certainty in school funding.
- CTA believes that the Local Control Funding Formula should be continuously appropriated to ensure the flow of education dollars to California's public schools without disruption.
- CTA believes that the Local Control Funding Formula base grant should be increased beyond COLA and should utilize benchmarks to increase the LCFF base grant over time.
- CTA continues to support supplemental and concentration grants to meet the unique needs of California students. CTA supports efforts to close the achievement gap. However, CTA opposes allocating funding based on test scores.
- CTA opposes any policy changes to the LCFF that would require the State Board of Education to
  modify regulations related to allowable LCFF expenditures. Additionally, CTA believes any policy
  changes should be vetted through the Legislative policy committees.

- CTA supports additional funding to the California State Teachers' Retirement System through additional non-Proposition 98 General Fund to reduce district contributions. CTA supports maintaining the integrity and implementation of AB 1469(Chapter 47, Statutes of 2014), which provided a long-term funding plan for CalSTRS.
- CTA supports increasing funding for special education. CTA believes providing adequate funding to special education to fully fund the cost of special education is needed to support increased student needs and costs. Existing state and federal mandates for special education should be funded fully before adding new program requirements or incentives.
- CTA supports maintaining the LCFF and providing, at a minimum, the statutory COLA for the LCFF.
- CTA supports, at a minimum, providing the statutory COLA on the remaining K-12 education categorical programs.
- CTA supports investing in educator retention and recruitment in order to address the state's
  educator shortage, especially in chronic shortage areas. CTA supports reducing financial barriers
  to becoming an educator, when possible, to alleviate the educator shortage and ensure a
  diverse educator workforce.
- CTA believes schools should be protected from reductions in funding during emergencies, including wildfires, pandemics and other natural disasters, in order to maintain services and support for students and staff.
- CTA believes any changes to attendance-based funding should be carefully considered and include a hold harmless for all local educational agencies.
- CTA believes Career and Technical Education funding should continue to be a priority and should be administered by the Department of Education.
- CTA supports community schools. However, funding for community schools for activities not customarily part of instruction should be paid for by non-Proposition 98 funding.
- One-time funding should be allocated equitably and made as flexible as possible to provide local educational agencies with discretion in addressing their unique needs.
- CTA supports expanding access to Transitional Kindergarten (TK), if implemented equitably and the appropriate resources are provided. CTA believes TK cannot be expanded within existing resources. CTA supports the "rebenching" of the Proposition 98 minimum guarantee to accommodate the expansion of TK.
- CTA believes school facilities should be funded with non-Proposition 98 funding.
- CTA supports extending COVID-19 Supplemental Paid Sick Leave benefits for all employees, including school staff.
- CTA supports funding to adequately fund school transportation.
- CTA supports maintaining the funding commitment to provide universal access to subsidized meals in schools.

#### **Adult Education Funding:**

- CTA supports the principle that all adult students should have access to fully funded adult education curriculum and programs.
- CTA supports at a minimum providing the statutory COLA for the Adult Education Program.

**Community College Association 2023-24 Budget Principles** 

CTA believes in the goals established in the Master Plan for Higher Education that the state should provide adequate funds for community colleges to fulfill the goals of both student access and a quality education and should provide necessary resources to meet the needs of all students who attend community colleges. CTA further believes adequate funding for public higher education is a necessity.

#### **Community College Funding:**

- CTA believes that the state should provide adequate funding for community colleges to ensure access to a tuition-free community college education for all students.
- CTA believes that Proposition 98 should be a floor and not a ceiling for education funding.
- CTA believes that we must protect the integrity of Proposition 98 and that we must support and monitor the Proposition 98 guarantee certification process to ensure it is properly implemented.
- CTA opposes any encroachment from non-Proposition 98 programs into the Proposition 98 side of the budget. CTA opposes any action which would reduce the Proposition 98 funding level.
- CTA believes that Proposition 98 should be protected from the reductions that occur when tax credits and giveaways are created that do not provide clear economic benefits to California.
   Existing tax credits that harm Proposition 98 and thus reduce PreK- 14 funding should be carefully reexamined and repealed where there has not been a benefit to the California economy and public education.
- CTA supports increased funding for part-time faculty support. Specifically, CTA supports additional funding to provide pay and benefits parity for part-time faculty, including office hours, professional development, health insurance and other supports.
- CTA believes that PreK 12 school districts and local community colleges are best suited to
  provide vocational instruction to the workforce in their communities. Statewide community
  college districts such as Calbright should be carefully monitored and only supported if they
  clearly provide a cost-effective benefit to the unique needs of under-employed Californians.
- CTA supports additional funding to the California State Teachers' Retirement System through non-Proposition 98 General Fund allocations in order to reduce community colleges' contributions. CTA supports maintaining the integrity and implementation of AB 1469 (Chapter 47, Statutes of 2014), which provided a long-term funding plan for CalSTRS.
- CTA supports increasing the base allocation for community colleges.
- CTA opposes funding based on completion metrics of any sort.
- CTA supports providing additional resources to low-income students, including CalGrants.
- CTA supports investing in efforts to bolster enrollment and retention rates for community college students.
- CTA supports at a minimum providing the statutory COLA on apportionments and all categorical programs.
- CTA supports increased funding for enrollment growth.
- CTA supports increasing the number of and diversity of full-time faculty to meet and exceed the 75/25 percent full-time faculty provisions of AB 1725.
- CTA supports investing in professional development for faculty.
- CTA supports the allocation of additional Proposition 51 bond funds to support eligible construction projects at community colleges. CTA believes facilities, including student housing, should be funded with non-Proposition 98 funding.
- CTA believes the state should monitor community colleges' reserve levels to ensure community colleges are utilizing resources on students and not accumulating excessive reserves.

• CTA supports extending COVID-19 Supplemental Paid Sick Leave benefits for all employees, including community college faculty (full-time and part-time) and staff.

## **NEW BUSINESS ITEMS**

#### NBI 1/23-1

CTA shall produce (with SPED Caucus & BATS) a forum on the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act to include: 1) Explanation of IDEA 2) How locals would benefit if IDEA was fully funded 3) How CTA could promote IDEA funding. Forum shall be presented at May 2023 state council.

Rationale: In 1975, Congress passed the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, and promised that, if needed, it could pay up to 40%. Unfortunately, despite an overwhelming need for increased education funding, Congress has never paid more than 17%. In California alone, this amounts to a \$2 billion annual shortfall – which local districts must cover. The time has come to demand that our elected leaders provide for our most vulnerable students. This forum is the first step in educating members on the full extent of the problem and the tools available to arrive at a solution.

LTSP Area: Organizing Culture

**LTSP Explanation:** As an organization, we need to escalate our fight for sustainable funding for our critical SPED programs. Educating members on the immense amount of money that the Federal government should be providing the IDEA program is the first important step. The IDEA Forum would explain, in depth, the IDEA program, how each local would specifically benefit, and all the various ways in which we could be using our state-wide organizing infrastructure in these efforts – including supporting initiatives at the NEA level.

That CTA provides resources, including a workshop at CTA conferences, to educate teachers, administrators, school boards and families about how single payer financing works, and how it could provide both financial benefits to school districts and healthcare benefits to all.

Rationale: The total health care spending in California is roughly \$517 billion annually and is funded by a patchwork of pay sources and administrative waste. A single-payer system will reduce cost to individuals and employers while improving health outcomes. For school districts, a huge percentage of revenue goes towards paying for health care benefits. With a single-payer system, the school districts will have more funds available for salaries and other educational uses. Many are hesitant to explore single-payer health care because the benefits and logistics of this type of system are not well understood.

LTSP Area: Advocacy

LTSP Explanation: CTA has a long history of advocating for change. Our school communities need to be informed about single-payer health care financing so we can work towards an equitable system. No one's access to healthcare should be determined by where they live, how much money they make, what company they work for, which school district they teach at, or how they and their families identify. Learning cannot take place when a person's health needs are not met.

That CTA forms a taskforce to advocate for single-payer health care in California. This taskforce would collaborate with other groups, including Healthy California Now (HCN) - an umbrella organization that is advocating for single payer in California. Affiliates of HCN include California Nurses Association (CNA) and other labor groups.

Rationale: CTA members and the general public do not understand the cost savings and other benefits that single-payer health care can provide. Education and advocacy are needed to explain the financing, how individuals would obtain health care, as well other benefits and details of single payer. A cost comparison of California's current system and a proposed single-payer system by the Political Economy Research Institute (PERI) found that a comprehensive single-payer system, even with the addition of dental and vision coverage, would have a net savings of 8% relative to our current system.

LTSP Area: Advocacy

LTSP Explanation: CTA has a long history of advocating for change. Our school communities need to be informed about single-payer health care financing so we can work towards an equitable system. No one's access to healthcare should be determined by where they live, how much money they make, what company they work for, which school district they teach at, or how they and their families identify. Learning cannot take place when a person's health needs are not met.

That CTA advocates for legislation regarding single-payer health care, and lobbies California's legislators to support it.

**Rationale:** We need legislation that would enact a comprehensive framework of governance, benefits, program standards, and health care cost controls for a single-payer health care system in California. Californians should receive health care services and other defined benefits without having copays, deductibles, or other out-of-pocket costs. Many studies have shown that a single-payer health care system with comprehensive coverage for all would produce massive savings on health care costs. There have been many single-payer bills introduced over the past two decades, and we're getting closer and closer to passage.

LTSP Area: Advocacy

LTSP Explanation: CTA has a long history of advocating for change. Our school communities need to be informed about single-payer health care financing so we can work towards an equitable system. No one's access to healthcare should be determined by where they live, how much money they make, what company they work for, which school district they teach at, or how they and their families identify. Learning cannot take place when a person's health needs are not met.

THE ABOVE ITEM WAS REFERRED TO THE CIVIL RIGHTS IN EDUCATION COMMITTEE

CTA shall add a linked handout or directions on accessing the LTSP Focus Area descriptions from the Strategic Plan to the NBI Submission Form by the LTSP Focus Area Rationale prompt.

Rationale: CTA should remove barriers to involvement and leader development whenever possible while also providing access to information about our union. While many State Council Delegates may be aware of the CTA Strategic Plan, using undefined acronyms without easy access to decipher the LTSP focus areas, it is an unnecessary hurdle to have the submission form formatted this way. Delegates are left to guess meanings from the drop-down menu or choose not to engage. Taking this easy step can lead to a more informed and engaged State Council delegation, as well as potential improvement in the quality of NBI submissions.

LTSP Area: Leadership

**LTSP Explanation:** Making the transition from a voting delegate at CTA State Council to a leader who views themselves as capable and supported in making an impact in the course of our union is one many delegates never make. While this can be by choice as leaders come with many different skill sets and voices, it should not be because the process is viewed as exclusive or that all information to engage is not easy to access or readily available to all.

Utilize CTA organizing and lobbying resources to convert Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE) Board selection process from the undemocratic appointment to democratic election to undo erosion of democratic principles.

Rationale: Creating a more democratic society is one of CTA's longtime stated goals. And yet, the largest school district (LAUSD) and an enormous portion of California's students are subject to the whims of an appointed school board. As a result, unworthy charter schools receive approval overriding the thoughtful denials by local democratically elected school boards. LCAPs that are submitted to LACOE are denied or forced to contain items that are not locally driven solutions. There is currently not sufficient oversight of LACOE and it is incredibly undemocratic, eroding democracy throughout Los Angeles County.

LTSP Area: Transforming Our Profession

LTSP Explanation: The tyranny of appointed LACOE school board overriding elected local boards allows for our profession to be devalued and democracy to be eroded. This NBI will push for that tyranny to be lifted for teachers in Los Angeles County and allow for democratic oversight to bring back true local control.

#### NBI 1/23-7

I move that CTA set up a Gun Violence Prevention Task Force; work with Gun Violence organizations within the state of CA; make an orange CTA Shirt to wear on gun violence prevention days; adjourn CTA State Council in memory of those murdered in Monterey Park and Half Moon Bay.

**Rationale:** We have an epidemic of gun violence in our schools, churches, dance clubs, grocery stores, parades, etc. We need to be bold and demand that Congress act to make our communities safe. We need to support our members at school sites. This NBI will help coordinate a cohesive effort within CTA and with external organizations. https://www.nea.org/gunviolence

LTSP Area: Advocacy

**LTSP Explanation:** CTA has a responsibility to its members to advocate for safe workplaces. In that context, we need to be organizing with community organizations and politicians to ensure safe schools and communities.

Provide more training and Professional Development through CTA Conferences for educational support providers who service students within our locals such as: psychologists, counselors, SLP's, librarians (media specialists), and nurses in the 2023-24 school year and beyond.

**Rationale:** As dues paying members, these professionals should be afforded the opportunity to attend CTA Conferences and Professional Development sessions that focus on the unique needs within their student populations. Sessions streamlined for these professionals will result in "best practices" that will benefit and improve the entire teaching profession and the students' they service.

LTSP Area: Transforming Our Profession

**LTSP Explanation:** According to the CTA Handbook, "Professional Development Programs should be equally accessible to all faculty members (full and part-time)" (HE: April 1989, October 1989). With the increase in student needs, all members of the staff should get the best training to meet all students' social and emotional needs.

CTA will lobby to pass legislation creating UCs/CSUs in areas severely lacking them that doesn't take over or remove community college locations already existing in those areas. Some focus areas would be Oakland, Stockton/Tracy, Tahoe, Inland Empire, the greater Los Angeles Region, and any other area that would qualify.

**Rationale:** Many areas of our state do not have UCs/CSUs that should, leading to a shortage of college degree workers in that area needed for certain jobs harming the community at large. Many of these areas are locations that are predominantly people of color further intensifying inequities in the state. It also leads to less teacher and support staff programs making it harder to meet the needs of our profession, community, and sustainability of our districts.

LTSP Area: Diversity - Social Justice

LTSP Explanation: The ability to have a college that strengthens our communities should not be decided by the wealth of the zip code you live in or how much influence the part of the state you live in has. We need more colleges to allow for our student graduates to be able to continue their education. Our communities need more UCs and CSUs to ensure we have the workers we need in our communities to support them in their growth and development over time. We need them to ensure we have teacher and support staff programs to ensure the sustainability of our professions and our districts.

THE ABOVE ITEM WAS REFERRED TO THE FINANCING PUBLIC EDUCATION COMMITTEE

CTA will have a permanent booth presence for representation and recruitment at all prides in cities with 100 thousand people or more. In cities less than 100 thousand people CTA will offer to assist and support the local chapter with whatever they need to have a booth at their pride.

**Rationale:** Our LGBTQIA+ members and students are under attack by extremist who want us out of the profession and our students back in the closet. By enacting this NBI it strengthens CTA's commitment to our queer community, students, and the promise to both hire and retain more teachers from within it. It should be a guarantee that CTA is at pride events and/or supporting local chapters in being always present at smaller sized pride events. Enacting this would be both a physical and emotional show of permanent support for the LGBTQIA+ community by CTA.

LTSP Area: Community Engagement

**LTSP Explanation:** Queer people are a part of our community and our schools. By being at Prides it shows that our CTA members aren't just in the classroom and that CTA supports our LGBTQIA+ members as well as our students and staff. It also strengthens CTA's goal of commitment to hiring and retaining members from our community within this profession.

CTA will utilize their organizing and lobbying resources to make climate change studies and curriculum mandatory by law to be taught in schools at all grade levels.

**Rationale:** Our planet and climate are changing as we've seen with our difficult weather or the last two months. At the same time, we have people actively trying to deny climate change and block it from being taught in our schools. In order to have any kind of future we need real and accurate lessons about climate change being taught in our schools no matter what part of the state you live in.

LTSP Area: Diversity - Social Justice

LTSP Explanation: Climate change has been proven to impact the poor and people of color the most. In order to make change and make the right choices for our future students need to learn about this topic in all grade levels. Last year assembly bill 1939, which was about this very issue, made it over to the senate but died in the education committee. With a strong push from CTA we can make something similar get through this session. This is a social justice issue with dire ramifications that we are seeing more each year from climate change and we need to act on this sooner rather than later.

THE ABOVE ITEM WAS REFERRED TO THE CURRICULUM & INSTRUCTION COMMITTEE

CTA shall systematically explore expanding CTA voting recommendations to include judges where it is seen in advance to have interests consistent with our goals.

**Rationale:** CTA has a stake in politics across the board as the process by which individuals often setting policy are chosen. However, we neglect a key piece of political infrastructure by ignoring court appointments. Even at lower court levels, judges are instrumental in interpreting existing law and statutes and hardening their meaning. We easily notice negative effects of the highest judges with reversals of Roe v. Wade and Abood v. Detroit Board of Education; however, there are incremental but tangible effects happening every day throughout the state, and CTA should explore taking action wherever we can.

LTSP Area: Diversity - Social Justice

**LTSP Explanation:** Exploring expansion of CTA recommendations to judge appointments is a proactive step toward ensuring high quality opportunities and resources for everyone and avoiding unfavorable interpretations of the law from becoming solidified. It is a systemic way to prevent anti-public education and proprivatizer appointments from moving up the ranks within the system and has the potential to create a better pool of candidates for higher ranking court positions in the future.

CTA will create instructional videos and communicate with members registered as Democrats in order to: 1) Educate members about how to register to vote in future ADEM elections. 2) Educate members on how to vote in these elections. 3) Educate members to how to run as ADEM delegates.

**Rationale:** Some members who tried to run or vote in ADEMs really struggled. People didn't understand the Pin number issue, how to join a slate or reach out to organization that endorse, and many had issues with where or how to cast ballots. Creating instructional videos would help with this by allowing people to visually see how it works and having more communication whether it be through more reminder emails or phone calls would really help in building the support members need to do something like ADEM's. Especially if it is their first time trying to run for it.

LTSP Area: Organizing Culture

LTSP Explanation: If we want to organize and have our members more involved in ADEM's so that our union's voice is heard, we will need to make it easier to understand. Creating instructional videos makes it easier for people to visually see what they need to do step by step in order to organize together and be involved in the process. Further communication through follow up emails or calls helps prevent people from falling through the cracks and helps in keeping their spirits up to continue the process because they know they are being supported. If we want to organize people to be our union's voice in ADEM's we need to make sure they know how to do it and be involved in the process whether that is by running in it or by voting in it.

CTA shall incorporate language into official policy that states that the CTA fully supports funding the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act at a minimum of 40% – and any legislative or organizational efforts to facilitate that action.

**Rationale:** In 1975, Congress passed the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, and promised that, if needed, it could pay up to 40%. Unfortunately, despite an overwhelming need for increased education funding, Congress has never paid more than 17%. In California alone, this amounts to a \$2 billion annual shortfall – which local districts must cover. The time has come to demand that our elected leaders provide for our most vulnerable students. Incorporating support for fully funding IDEA into CTA policy is a critical step for all future actions.

LTSP Area: Structure and Governance

**LTSP Explanation:** As an organization, we need to escalate our fight for sustainable funding for our critical SPED programs. Correcting CTA policy is the first step in educating members on the immense amount of money that the Federal government should be providing the IDEA program – and is the first important step to ensuring that future actions, such as an IDEA Forum or other organizational efforts, receive full CTA support.

LTSP Explanation: In the spirit of building Union community, capacity, and an organizing culture, it would be in the best interest of our Union to allow all members to nominate other members for all awards. In some instances, what is real/perceived "gate-keeping" limits who is nominated for such awards. Let us let ALL members shine. Let us let all members be recognized and considered for all awards offered by local chapters, service centers, and CTA as a body.

#### NBI 1/23-18

That CTA provide training and support for all local chapters and presidents on how to handle difficult situations in their chapter including but not limited to the weaponizing of Robert's Rules to obstruct business and using devices to record member votes at Rep Council.

**Rationale:** All CTA members deserve a safe space to cast votes without fear of intimidation or retaliation during union meetings. We should champion the Democratic process and support the will and decisions made by the majority.

LTSP Area: Leadership

**LTSP Explanation:** Local chapters and leaders are currently not prepared to deal with difficult situations such as the ones mentioned above that impede local chapters from doing business in a safe and respectful environment.

#### NBI 1/23-20

LTSP Area: Diversity - Social Justice

**LTSP Explanation:** By facilitating full participation for members with disabilities, we are working towards our commitment to equity and fairness.

#### NBI 1/23-24

It should be CTA policy that schools in California are funded on the more equitable method of total enrollment as opposed to the current, problematic ADA funding method.

**Rationale:** Schools in the State of California lose millions of dollars each year to ADA adjustments. These are dollars that had been promised by Prop 98 to these schools that are being clawed back by the state due to student absences, even though student absences do not decrease the costs of school operation. In fact, many districts have board policies that require teachers to teach, reteach, and accept work from students who were absent for excused or unexcused absences. In many instances, this even requires additional costs as schools spend money on credit recovery programs for students with excessive absenteeism.

Taking money away from these schools, even as they spend additional resources to educate students after their absence, takes money away from some of the most vulnerable students in our state.

#### NBI 1/23-26

I move that CTA amend the Human and Civil Rights Policy by adding a section on Environmental Justice on page 332 with the following language: "CTA supports the right of all students and members to equitable access to clean air, clean water, and a safe environment."

**Rationale:** The rise of the risks associated with climate change adds new challenges to our students, our facilities, and the health of our members. CTA needs the policy to guide our advocacy.

LTSP Area: Diversity - Social Justice

#### Retirement Savings Plans Pg. 240

CTA believes school district 403(b) and 457 plans should be financially beneficial to <u>current and future</u> members, responsibly managed, independently operated, and audited annually by a third party administrator (TPA) to ensure accountability. <u>CTA believes that when fiscal feasible, plans should be invested in a manner that supports educational equity for California students.</u> CTA believes selection of vendors shall be mutually agreed or affirmatively negotiated upon between the bargaining units and the district. This selection must be based on the merits of the investment instruments and not for financial or personal gain of an individual, association, district, employer and/or investment provider. CTA further believes that the exchange of gifts or any other remuneration is unethical and presents a conflict of interest.

#### **COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS**

#### **Civil Rights in Education Committee Recommendation(s)**

**Support** SB 59 Skinner

Enacts the Menstrual Product Accessibility Act, requiring all women's restrooms and all-gender restrooms in a building owned by the state or receiving state funding be stocked with menstrual products accessible to employees and the public, free of cost, at all times.

#### Financing in Public Education Committee Recommendation(s)

Watch AB 14 Davies

This is a spot bill stating legislative intent to enact legislation providing tax deductions for savings and investment accounts for childcare expenses.

Watch AB 17 Alanis

This is a spot bill stating legislative intent to enact legislation lifting the tax burden on the middle class by reducing income tax rates for middle and low-income taxpayers.

Watch AB 25 McCarty

This is a spot bill stating legislative intent to enact legislation establishing a debt-free college system.

Watch AB 26 Fong, Mike

Excludes from an individual's gross income, for taxable years beginning January 1, 2022, any amount of qualified student loan debt under the federal student loan debt relief plan and specifies provisions shall only become operative upon the enactment of legislation conforming to specified federal law.

Watch AB 35 Ting

Excludes from an individual's gross income, for taxable years beginning on January 1, 2021, and before January 1, 2026, the amount of certain student loans discharged, in whole or in part, after December 31, 2020, and before January 1, 2026, in conformity with federal law.

#### Watch AB 46 Ramos

Excludes from gross income, for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2024, and before January 1, 2034, retirement pay received by a taxpayer from the federal government for service performed in the uniformed services during the taxable year; and excludes from gross income annuity payments received by a qualified taxpayer pursuant to a United States Department of Defense Survivor Benefit Plan during the taxable year.

#### Watch AB 51 Bonta

This is a spot bill stating legislative intent to create a universal early care and education system, using the existing mixed-delivery system, promoting equity and access for all families.

#### Watch AB 52 Grayson

This is a spot bill stating legislative intent to expand the sales and use tax exemption for manufacturing and research and development equipment to preserve California's status as a hub of innovation and technology encouraging greater investment in California.

#### Watch AB 59 Gallagher

Increases eligibility for the renter's tax credit, for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2022, and before January 1, 2027, for spouses filing joint returns, heads of household, and surviving spouses if adjusted gross income is \$150,000 or less, as adjusted, and for other individuals if adjusted gross income is \$75,000 or less (for 2021, the adjusted gross income limit was \$87,066 and \$43,533, respectively).

#### Watch AB 91 Alvarez

Exempts from the nonresident tuition fee a nonresident, low-income student who is a resident of Mexico, registers for lower division courses at a San Diego and Imperial Counties Community Colleges Association (SDICCCA) college, and resides within 45 miles of the California-Mexico border; prohibits more than 200 students at each SDICCCA college from being exempted from payment of the nonresident tuition fee each academic year; and authorizes these students to be reported as resident Full Time Equivalent Students for state apportionment purposes.

#### Watch AB 95 Hoover

Requires school districts to approve an intradistrict transfer request for a student of the school district if the school of attendance is in the red or orange performance band in two or more of the state measures for three consecutive years on the California School Dashboard; allows for an interdistrict transfer, if there is no available school for an intradistrict; and prohibits the school district of residence from prohibiting that transfer if the school district of proposed enrollment approves the application for transfer.

#### Watch ACA 1 Aguiar-Curry

Makes changes to the state constitution to lower the necessary vote threshold from a two-thirds supermajority to 55% to approve local general obligation bonds and special taxes for affordable housing and public infrastructure projects.

#### Watch ACA 2 Alanis

Establishes the Water and Wildfire Resiliency Fund and requires the Treasurer to annually transfer an amount equal to 3% of all state revenues from the General Fund to the Water and Wildfire Resiliency Fund; requires the moneys in the fund to be appropriated by the Legislature; and requires 50% of the moneys in the fund be used for water projects, and the other 50% of the moneys in the fund be used for forest maintenance and health projects.

#### Watch SB 1 Glazer

Excludes from gross income, for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2022, and before January 1, 2026, any student loan amount waived, canceled, or otherwise forgiven by the United States Department of Education pursuant to a specified federal student debt relief plan.

#### Watch SB 25 Skinner

Excludes from an individual's gross income, for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2021, and before January 1, 2026, the amount of certain student loans discharged, in whole or in part, after December 31, 2020, and before January 1, 2026, in conformity with federal law.

#### Watch SB 28 Glazer

Establishes the Public Preschool, K–12, and College Health and Safety Bond Act of 2024 as a state general obligation bond act to provide \$15.5 billion to construct and modernize education facilities (TK-16); becomes operative only if approved by the voters at the March 5, 2024, statewide primary election; and makes other changes to the School Facilities Bond program.

#### Watch SB 49 Becker

This is a spot bill stating intent to enact legislation to provide tax incentives for the construction of solar canopies over large parking lots to boost the local generation of clean electricity in urban and suburban areas.

#### **Negotiations Committee Recommendation(s)**

#### **Support** AB 1 McKinnor

Enacts the Legislature Employer-Employee Relations Act, providing employees of the Legislature the right to form, join, and participate in the activities of employee organizations of their own choosing for the purpose of representation on all matters of employer-employee relations.

#### Professional Rights & Responsibilities Committee Recommendation(s)

#### Watch SB 47 Roth

Requires an agency receiving a report of known or suspected child abuse to take specified actions within specified timeframes and requires an investigator to contact the person who made the report and visit the subject of the report, in person to determine if the child should be removed from the home during the pendency of an investigation into a report of child abuse or neglect.

#### **Retirement Committee Recommendation(s)**

**Support** SJR 1 Cortese

Requests the Congress of the United States to enact, and the President to sign, legislation repealing the Government Pension Offset and the Windfall Elimination Provision from the Social Security Act.
